My First Model a Ford

My name is Richard Alexander and this is a story of how I came to own my first Model A. I was born and raised in Lompoc, Ca. My father was in the water well drilling and pump industry. This meant that he was in and out of the farms and ranches constantly. Being a family business, we boys would help after school and on weekends. As we got into our early teens my dad asked what we were going to do when we got our driver's license? He said he wasn't going to be providing cars for us, so we had better look around in some of the scrap piles on these farms and try and find some old cars to put together. Not knowing anything about cars, the hunt was on. It seemed that there were quite a few old Ford parts. I finally decided that there were more Model a parts than anything else. I started reading up on the Model A. and decided that was what I wanted. I started gathering anything Model A that someone would give me. I came across a pick up cab and box on one ranch, the owner said that I could have it. This was going to be my Model A project. I found out that it was a 1931 Budd cab and wide pickup box. The fever was started and I began to live Model A's. Over the next couple of years I learned about these cars and finally was able to get my pick up finished except rear fenders. I didn't realize that this body style took special fenders. I did find out that I didn't need them to license or drive it so I could try and find a set later. It seemed fascinating to me that these were so simple. I could fix just about anything on it with a pair of pliers and bailing wire. The day I was 16, I got my license and started driving my pick up to school. My start into the Model A world almost 60 years ago. When I was a junior in high school, I found out that one of my mother's relatives had an all original 1937 Ford Tudor slant back sedan for sale. I jumped at the opportunity to buy it, my dad thought I had lost my mind. Things worked out and I bought the car for \$300. This started my obsession for my journey with old Fords. I currently have over 30 old cars with half being Model A's. I still enjoy working on these examples of automotive history.

Jim's Tech Tips

"Preventing Problems with the Starter Switch"

The Starter Switch Rod passes through the firewall and screws into the Starter Switch. You step on the head of the rod to start the Car. You will find that today's reproduction rods screw quite easily into and out of the switch. This can be nice when you are assembling things.



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But I have found that on more than just a few cars the engine vibration can cause the rod to unscrew itself and back out of the switch. You hit a bump and the rod drops down and makes contact with the post on the starter switch, where the battery cable connects. Yikes! That's a direct short to ground, with a LOT of amps behind it. So you want to make the rod a bit harder to turn when installing it in the switch. Add a small drop of blue thread locker to the rod before you screw it in, or gently tap the threads a little with a hammer to deform them and make them harder to screw in and out.

Another simple solution, if you are not doing a car for Fine Point Judging (because it is not how the switch was originally done), is to add a 5/16" nut to the threaded end of the rod before screwing it into the switch. When you have the rod where you want it (desired button height inside the car, etc.) use that nut as a jam nut and lock the rod to the switch. It will not back out while driving, but you can easily undo it when you need to take it apart.

Whichever approach you choose, you will have more trouble-free miles if you get ahead of this potential problem. Until next time...

Norgrove RR Model A Tour

Our February Tour was an amazing visit to the Norgrove Railroad in Arroyo Grande, nestled in a 128acre private vineyard and Lemon Grove. The 24-gauge restored engine and open rail cars were a delightful experience as we rode through the beautiful countryside. The weather was nearly perfect. This restored train and facility are the product of the Norgrove Team, including owner Peter Nott and his team. We chugged over 2 miles of track including tunnels and bridges and even made a stop at the Recreated early 20th century Train Station.

Owner Peter acquired his love of trains and railroad operations from his grandfather in Australia in the early 1950s. The diesel-powered engine pulling the train today was acquired from South Africa found rusting in a field with 5 ft tall grass and poisonous snakes all around; so needless to say it was a process to retrieve it from it's location, transport it down a river to a seaport and then load it onto a ship where it arrived weeks later in Long Beach. Then to move it from Long Beach to Arroyo Grande, CA.

In addition to the working trains, Peter has a full restoration shop complete with a machine shop and paint booth, and construction area. Peter also shared with us his plans for expansion that will incorporate period correct building / train station with complete wine making production. He estimates the project will be complete is about 3 years. Train rides will be free for future wine club members.

We had a late lunch and rain started around 3pm. Abigail got wet on the way home, but the trip was well worth the time needed to clean her up after. Words can't adequately describe this amazing place - check out the photos.
